Message from the Executive Director and President

What a year!

Without question, 2009 has been one of the most significant years in AOE Arts Council's 23-year history. A year ago, in the gym of our old home in the Cyrville Community Centre, we celebrated our impending move into the Shenkman Arts Centre and congratulated all who had worked tirelessly for more than two decades to achieve that dream.

Finally, as winter gave way to spring and the finishing touches were made to the arts centre – and to our spacious offices within it – we packed our bags and headed east. If the first five months of 2009 were spent planning for the day the Shenkman Arts Centre would open, then the next seven were spent adjusting to change and meeting the ongoing opportunities and challenges of being a lead partner in the most exciting arts initiative our city has seen in decades.

The greatest source of pride with the opening of the Centre is the success of the ARTicipate Endowment Fund Campaign. This visionary fund will provide financial support in perpetuity for artistic activity within the Shenkman Arts Centre to benefit and strengthen our arts community. As 2009 drew to a close, the fund was close to reaching 90 per cent of its \$5-million goal. In addition to leading this initiative and the associated awareness-raising campaign, AOE Arts Council will manage the annual disbursement process in the form of grants to the arts community.

Our responsibility to the ARTicipate campaign has become one of AOE's top priorities, as has our role as a resident arts partner within the Shenkman Arts Centre. In addition, we are continually striving to balance these new responsibilities with our fundamental and ongoing mandate as an arts council to provide services, resources and development opportunities to our diverse membership. These undertakings require significant human and financial resources.

Over the next three to five years, we project continued growth. The implications are two-fold: AOE must secure increased financial support to match our vision and achieve our goals, and we must manage change. With respect to the first challenge, we will continue to build on the foundation already established for expanded fundraising, increased membership, innovative business partnerships and more public sector funding.

To effectively manage change, we must balance the needs of both our younger and older members and audiences; ensure we meet the needs of amateur, emerging and professional artists; serve both francophone and anglophone communities; and remain relevant to all sectors of the arts community.

AOE is a strong community arts council with a dedicated team that has the capacity and tenacity to carry out its mission and attain its vision. We are more than capable of meeting the challenges that the events of recent history are presenting. Together, we can create a future in which these opportunities make us better and stronger. We know we have the strength of our membership behind us.

Arrival at the Shenkman Arts Centre

In the spring of 2009, a dream 20 years in the making finally became a reality as the Shenkman Arts Centre opened its doors. AOE Arts Council embraced a new home, new challenges and a world of new opportunities in a space destined to become a hub for the arts in the east-end.

AOE's new location in the Shenkman Arts Centre means the Council will be more effective in working with the community to develop partnerships and enhance the visibility and support for local artists and arts organizations.

The larger AOE office space has created a beautiful location for member artists to display their work. AOE's new location also provides a working, meeting and reception space for AOE and its members, as well as office space for a contemporary dance company and other potential arts organizations in the future.

The Shenkman Arts Centre has already had a profound impact on cultural life in the community and the city at large. It plays a catalytic role in providing artists with a forum to network and nurture their creativity, while simultaneously providing the community with a rich variety of programming and artistic activities in a state-of-the-art facility.

The exciting partnership between the resident partners in the Centre – Mouvement d'implication francophone d'Orléans (MIFO), OYP Theatre School, the Ottawa School of Art, Gloucester Pottery School and AOE Arts Council, as well as the City of Ottawa – has blossomed, with AOE taking a leadership role in the process. These established community partners are thriving in their new location, expanding their programming and services and attracting audiences from the east-end and beyond.

The five resident arts partners together with the City and the Shenkman Arts Centre leadership form an advisory committee that meets on a regular basis and works towards the common goal of creating a dynamic creative hub where artists and audiences of all ages gather to create and explore the arts.

The Shenkman Arts Centre is proud to provide activities in both official languages, and strives to respect and enrich the multicultural heritage of our community.

ARTicipate Endowment Fund and Community Campaign

AOE understood from the beginning that a self-sustaining plan was required to ensure ongoing artistic activity at the Shenkman Arts Centre. For the past two years, the ARTicipate Endowment Fund Campaign, spearheaded by AOE, has been fundraising to ensure that rich, bilingual and accessible programming can continue within the Centre. The ARTicipate Endowment Fund has now raised 90 percent of its \$5 million goal, and the numbers continue to grow.


The Endowment Fund was established in 2007 through the gift of \$1 million from the Shenkman Family Foundation and a grant of \$2.5 million from the Province of Ontario. As of summer 2010, the interest income generated by this fund will be disbursed according to guidelines developed by AOE Arts Council, in keeping with the overall vision for the fund to support artistic programming within the Centre for generations to come.

In December 2009, AOE signed a 5-year agreement with the City to continue to build the ARTicipate Endowment Fund.




Membership

Operations

PLANNING

AOE Arts Council's new Strategic Plan, "Reaching Our Creative Potential," outlines the Council's strategic priorities for the next three years. The years 2010 to 2012 will be some of the most exciting – and most challenging – in the Council's history. In preparation for the challenges ahead, AOE has laid out a work plan that will guide its activities and objectives, with the aim of fulfilling the potential laid out in the Strategic Plan. The work plan will serve as a record of annual achievements and a guidance document for the AOE team to refer to on a continual basis.

In addition to the above planning documents, AOE also completed a detailed business plan that reviewed the Council's accomplishments, challenges and opportunities as it looks to the future and strives to reach its potential.


ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

On March 10, 2009, AOE's Annual General Meeting was the last to be held in the Cyrville Community Centre before the move to the Shenkman Arts Centre. The Executive Director, Christine Tremblay, summed up everyone's excitement about the upcoming move and the possibilities that lay ahead. The Treasurer, Éric Robineau, presented the year-end financial report, noting that AOE's financial position was more positive compared to the previous year and highlighting the success of the ARTicipate Campaign. The reception which followed honoured longtime AOE staff member Lise Roy, who due to illness celebrated an earlier than expected retirement after 12 years of dedicated and enthusiastic service.

Sources of Funding

As a not-for-profit organization, AOE is reliant upon many diverse sources of funding. In 2009 funding came from a variety of grants, including the City of Ottawa Service Agreement, City of Ottawa Capacity-Building, the Ontario Arts Council and the Ontario Trillium Foundation. AOE has also applied to the Provincial Ministry of Culture, the Creative Communities Prosperity Fund and private foundations to secure further financial support. Revenue from sponsorships, donations, fundraising and earned revenues such as room rental, equipment rental and memberships also helped to sustain AOE's activities.

As AOE continues to grow and dream, the challenge is to secure the increased financial support to match its vision.

ARTinis & Appetizers 2009

On October 22, 2009, ARTinis & Appetizers was held in the Shenkman Arts Centre. This elegant cocktail evening brought together artists, arts supporters and members of the business community with sumptuous foods, exciting arts demonstrations and live entertainment. A silent auction featured donated items, gift certificates and works of art. The event was well-attended by 250+ guests and provided increased visibility to both AOE and the Shenkman Arts Centre. It also provided an opportunity to form strong sponsorship associations with businesses in the Orléans community.

Marketing and Promotions

INFOARTS KIOSKS

In 2009, AOE installed a second infoARTS kiosk in the upper lobby of the Shenkman Arts Centre just outside the Council's offices. This new infoARTS station joins the existing kiosk in Place d'Orléans Shopping Centre as a vehicle for AOE to promote its events, member events and the programs and activities within the Centre.

Members are encouraged to drop off promotional material for distribution in the kiosks. Thousands of flyers, brochures, course lists and postcards were distributed via the infoARTS kiosks in 2009.

NEW AOE WEBSITE

In April 2009, AOE unveiled its new interactive website, made possible by a \$25,500 grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation. The new site allows AOE to better achieve its goal of promoting, supporting and developing the arts in Ottawa. E-based information and online networking are the way of the future, and AOE is committed to using technology to support and further its vision.

SOCIAL MEDIA

With the goal of a broader online presence, AOE decided to expand its web network to include social networking. In December 2009, AOE's social networking plan was put into place, paving the way for the launch of AOE's Facebook presence in early 2010.

INFORMATION DISSEMINATION

AOE has improved its methods for distributing information, both in terms of frequency and the tools used to manage e-mail lists. Sharing opportunities and promoting its members through e-news bulletins is an important service provided by the Council.

AOE GALLERY

The new AOE offices provide an amazing space for exhibiting members' artwork. In 2009, the AOE Gallery displayed three different shows including both group and solo exhibits. The AOE Gallery accepts proposals from member artists for exhibit blocks of three months, and strongly encourages individual members and groups of artists who are members to submit a proposal.



SELECTIONS 2009

The number of entries to AOE's annual juried art show increased again this year, and AOE's membership impressed the jury with an outstanding body of work in a variety of media including acrylic, oil, photography, sculpture, textile art and digital techniques. The exhibition was held from October 1 to 27 in both salons of the beautiful Trinity Art Gallery in the Shenkman Arts Centre.

The vernissage was an overwhelming success and four works of art were sold. This year's exhibit also introduced three AOE Jury Prizes, in which each of the three jury members selected an artist for an individual "Juror's Choice" recognition. The 2009 winners were Ranajit Sinha, Ann Sutherland Gruchy and Lucy Kuwahara.

NETWORKING

With a beautiful new office space that's fabulous for entertaining, AOE has created new opportunities for its members to get together! AOE held several receptions, potlucks, "meet 'n' munch" evenings and get-togethers in 2009, beginning with the opening reception in June and finishing the year off with a holiday potluck.

Publications

ARTNEWS

ARTnews provides upcoming event information, highlights opportunities for professional development, addresses current issues in the arts sector, recognizes the achievements of artists and arts groups in the community, and profiles AOE members. In 2009, ARTnews shifted from a newsletter format towards a more "newsmagazine" feel, incorporating more articles, a new, visually compelling layout and a greater focus on membership and member activities. The reception of the changes has been very positive from members. ARTnews was published quarterly in 2009 with an annual distribution of 6000 copies.

CALENDAR OF EVENTS

The Calendar of Events is a key marketing tool for AOE's member artists and arts organizations. This professional quality publication has a broad distribution throughout the city (including through AOE's infoARTS kiosks) and provides promotional opportunities for members as well as valuable information about arts events for the community.

AOE CORPORATE PIECE

A full colour promotional card was created for AOE Arts Council's grand opening in the Shenkman Arts Centre. The corporate piece included a brief description of AOE's mandate and a call to action to join as a member or supporter.

Community Engagement and Arts Development

COMMUNITY ART PROJECT

Members of the public were invited to create a collaborative work of art during the Shenkman Arts Centre grand opening. The community art project was led by local stained glass artist Michel Martel. With Martel's guidance, visitors of all ages helped to create a two-pane mosaic of a flowing female figure. The finished work now proudly hangs in AOE's office for all to enjoy.

MY NEIGHBOURHOOD, MY VOICE

In partnership with the University of Ottawa and the Ottawa Coalition of Community Health Care Centres, AOE helped a community-based arts project to take place in Ottawa. The project trained and equipped people to photograph aspects of their communities that they value as well as things in their community that concern them and are in need of change. The photos were exhibited at Ottawa City Hall on June 9th, 2009, and a book featuring images from the project was produced.

WRITERS IN THE COMMUNITY

As in previous years, AOE partnered with the City of Ottawa to encourage the development of local literary talent. Through the "Writers in the Community" workshop series, four authors imparted their wisdom to aspiring authors and writing enthusiasts. Rachna Gilmore demystified the art of writing children's fiction, Shane Rhodes presented writing exercises for poets, Joanne Proulx shared tips for crafting a novel and Michelle Desbarats explored how the city can inspire us with urban poetry.

YOUTH POETRY WORKSHOP

In spring 2009, AOE partnered with the League of Canadian Poets to offer a poetry workshop for youth at the Wabano Centre for Aboriginal Health, animated by local poet Terry Ann Carter. This workshop was designed to help young people improve their writing and presentation skills, equipping them with the tools necessary to organize poetry events in their community.

AOE WORKSHOPS

AOE develops workshop rosters focused on delivering interesting and relevant professional development opportunities to its membership and to the community at large. Offerings in 2009 included a creative writing workshop, introductions to writing an artist statement, jury process, creating a brand, and media relations, as well as information technology workshops covering the basics of blogging and PowerPoint.

RESOURCE LIBRARY

During the summer of 2009, AOE was hard at work preparing for the opening of an exciting resource library within its offices, including information within all arts disciplines as well as resources for arts administration. A cataloguing system was developed, enabling members to check out library materials as of September. The resource library includes books, periodicals, audiovisual materials and printed versions of online resources.













ORLÉANS FESTIVAL

In 2009, AOE collaborated with business and community members in the planning and development of a new east-end arts festival designed to showcase local and out-of-town artists, to share the diverse cultures within our "village," and to engage the community in a dynamic and creative experience. The Orléans Festival, which will replace AOE's longstanding FestivARTS festival, will hold its inaugural event on June 6, 2010.

The time has come for the east-end community in Ottawa to experience a quality, professional festival in its own backyard. AOE is proud to engage with emerging and professional artists and community arts groups, inviting the entire community to experience the potential of the Shenkman Arts Centre.

Advocacy

In 2009, as in previous years, AOE was committed to fulfilling its crucial advocacy role, supporting, defending and fighting for the rights and recognition of the local arts community.

AOE Arts Council is a member of the steering committee with the Arts Councils' Network, reviewing the role of community arts councils and their positioning within the Ontario Arts Council.

AOE was also active within the greater Ottawa arts network to advocate for increased arts funding and commitment to the last year of the Arts Investment Strategy.

The Council attended meetings with east-end councilors, MPPs and MPs and participated in both French and English focus groups for the Arts Investment Strategy refresh. AOE also participated in the 2009 Arts Summit organized by Ottawa Centre MP Paul Dewar.

On November 18, 2009, AOE Arts Council was honoured at the TD Canada Trust People's Choice Business Awards as the Community Support/Non-Profit Organization of the Year.

*A0E Arts Council (A0E) is the leader of a \$5,000,000 fundraising campaign to create the ARTicipate Endowment Fund. All funds raised are deposited into an AOE bank account and subsequently transferred into the Shenkman Arts Centre Endowment Fund Reserve (now known as the ARTicipate Endowment Fund), created by the City of Ottawa for that exclusive purpose.

The ARTicipate Endowment Fund was established in 2007. The City Treasurer manages this fund in accordance with the City of Ottawa Investment Policy and the Municipal Act. The interest income generated by this fund supports the administration of the ARTicipate campaign. As of 2010, the interest generated will be disbursed to support the resident Arts Partners within the Centre, artists and arts activities that advance local art production and presentation at the Shenkman Arts Centre and the administration of the fund.
